The operations of enemy destroyers in the Western Channel last week have called attention to necessity of a striking force of torpedo-carrying A/C being at my immediate disposal. When enemy destroyers are located, chances of intercepting and successfully bringing them to action on a dark night are small They may often return to Brest after dawn, but surface forces cannot safely be used to intercept them off Brest in daylight due to danger of air attack. Enemy destroyers are faster than J's and K's Torpedo-carrying A/C would often have an excellent chance of cutting them off. The great importance of being able to distinguish between British and German destroyers in poor light makes it most desirable that a F.A.A. unit should be used. (C. in C., W.A. 2010/1 to Admty.)

Personal for A.O.C. in C. from C.A.S. Your A.477 29/11. We must, anticipate that by Spring of 1941 further extensions of operations will take place in Balkans and/or Turkey and the main sphere of operations may move there from Africa. We are now considering the possibility of further reinforcements, additional to those promised, and have in mind very tentatively 6 Fighter and 6 Medium Bomber Squadrons. Can your present administrative and depot organisation maintain these additional squadrons without heavy reinforcements to these services. These further Medium Bomber and Fighter squadrons would be sent to you as opportunity occurred but would not be allowed to interfere with existing programme. In order to make use of fine weather opportunity medium bombers might be flown out from end of December onward and would have to be stored until the squadron personnel arrived about end of February or March. Will inform you when final decision is reached but at present you cannot rely upon these 12 squadrons.

Regilemoneum.

In our X.527 25/11 and X.975 28/11 we have referred to the necessity of pressing on with aerodromes in Turkey and in Greek islands and mainland. Plan these to make it possible to operate a high proportion of your force now in Egypt together with the Air Forces now in Greece and such reinforcements as we may be able to provide, say, a sum total in the Balkans of 10 fighter, 10 medium and 3 heavy bomber squadrons. Greeks and Turks must be urged to prepare at once all-weather aerodromes with at least 1300 yards runways and if possible up to standard stated in x.527 25/11, approach roads, telephonic or telegraphic communications and as many as possible of the other necessary facilities and services. Your 0.734 and 0.737 1/11 have given us latest information on aerodromes in Crete and Turkey. Request you report now and fortnightly on progress of all aerodromes on Greek mainland and islands. If necessary for the security of our forces in Egypt you have authority to withdraw one Gladiator Squadron from Greece

without previous sanction from us, (Air Ministry to HQ, RAF, ME, 2125/5).



2. Daylight attacks by submerged U-boats on ships in convoy under escort are very rare, except on ships sailing independently or straggling from convoy.

5. U-boats are attacking convoys at nights and on the surface.

4. To counter these tactics. (Procedure)

5. Experience has shown that ships breaking out of convoy after attack at night are frequently sunk. Thus it is most important that convoy should maintain its formation after attack. To reduce the dangers of a salvo of torpedoes sinking several ships in convoy columns have recently been opened to five cables apart.

6. Ships must not hesitate to open fire on any U-boat sighted if range is clear. The temptation to withhold fire in the hopes of a subsequent easier shot must be resisted. The opportunity may never recur.





Your 1325/6/12. Unknown ship sighted at 0642/5/12 and chased steering S.S.W. Slowly overhauled and at 0757 signalled by searchlight to stop but as she did not do so fired one warning round, at approx. range 17,500 yards, which fell short. Enemy turned 030 degrees to port and fired 4 gun salvoes, CARNARVON CASTLE turning to port and closing, but for 25 minutes (1714 says "20 minutes") enemy was out of our range, although she made good shooting.

At 14,000 yds. enemy was hit and for some time fired only one gun, being apparently on fire aft.

She reappeared from behind the smoke having turned to starboard and firing 4 gun salvoes. At 0830 observed the track of 2 torpedoes on slightly diverging courses and latered course to starboard torpedoes passed about 50 yards on each side. Enemy was being hit up to this point, but about this time all CARNARVON CASTLE's control circuit and voice pipe and ammunition hoist motor were shot away, and accuracy of CARNARVON CASTLE's fire diminished very greatly. However enemy was again badly hit and her salvo reduced to one gun.

At 0844 at a range of 8,000 yards she reappeared with her port battery bearing and CARNARVON CASTLE was repeatedly hit being reported on fire amidship and in number two hold. At 0911 (1714 says 0910) decided to lengthen range in order to bring fire under control. Smoke was made and range opened the enemy continuing to make good shooting up to a range of 18,000 yards. When out of range and fire under control course was altered to endeavour to regain touch, but the enemy made smoke and disappeared in the haze. The fires in CARNARVON CASTLE were not completely out till 1115, and in view of damage decided to steer towards Montevideo. Three compartments were flooded.

During the whole of the engagement the enemy appeared to avoid close action, and sustained at least 10 hits. CARNARVON CASTLE suffered 23 direct hits two on the waterline and four others low enough to affect her seaworthiness. The weather was hazy and while it is certain that the enemy sustained considerable damage and had two serious fires it was not possible to ascertain details.

Enemy fire was very rapid, at times reaching three salvoes to CARNARVON CASTLE's one.

All officers and men behaved in accordance with the highest tradition of the service. (CARNARVON CASTLE 2101Z/6).

For A.O.C.in C. from D.of Plans. Your A.O.C.1 2/10. Grateful for your appreciation of situation relative to possible Japanese aggression against N.E.India and Assam. Your para.2. We agree your figure of 50 if attack were directed against India alone but do not think Japanese could operate as many as this if they were also engaged in operations against Malaya. Effort against you would be at extreme range and would not be sustained. Ranges of T.96 and T.97 which are latest known Japanese types are 1,100 and 1,250 miles respectively with full bomb load. This means:-

(a) They could not reach N.E. India and Assam from any aerodromes in Indo-China in their present condition.

(b) They could only reach Digboi from Yunnan if they succeeded in occupying Kunming or beyond: other places you mention would still be out of range.

(c) They could only reach N.E.India and Assam from Thailand if they could use aerodromes in the North-West. And then only at extreme range.

Para.2. If Italian type B.R.20 were available the radius of action would be increased by about 225 miles. But we do not think there are more than 10 of these aircraft available.

Pari, 5. As regards reinforcement India must for the present be dependent upon our policy of generally building up our resources in the East. Our target programme for the Far East is 6 bomber. 4 fighter, 2 torpedo bomber, 7 G.R. landplane and 3 G.R. flying boat squadrons. As more immediate measures we are shipping direct to Singapore from U.S.A. 100 Buffaloes to form 2 or possibly 3 fighter Squadrons and a further 70 Buffaloes as a general reserve. Also, 48 American bomber aircraft. We are also re-equipping the Singapore and Vildebeest Squadrons with P.B.Ys and Beauforts respectively. We hope to achive the fore-going substantially by April 1941. Foregoing does not prejudice 21 Squadron target programme for India.

At 2105 tonight a single E-Boat torpedoed the Danish N.C.MONBERG of 2301 tons in convoy F.S. 60 when some 2 miles South of Smiths Knoll Light Vessel. The N.C.MONBERG subsequently sank and, though engaged at full speed by WOOLSTON, the E-Boat escaped behind a smoke screen.

Brest was attacked by our aircraft during the night 14/15 and 2 heavy Bombs were seen to fall in the Target Area. Lorient was attacked by 4 aircraft of the Coastal Command during the night and damage is believed to have been done to Submarines and the Dockyard there. Special importance is now attached to Rosyth, and the Coastal Command has ordered that all aircraft should be routed from today to avoid the defended area.

Great Yarmouth was opened to navigation at 0851 this morning, and one red Mine was detonated in the Thames Estuary at 2115 last night by LL Trawlers. ADVENTURE is complete with Mines and fuel and at 4 hours notice; and the Mining Operation B.S. 47 has been postponed for a further 24 hours.

An unknown ship was sighted by a Trawler of the Northern Patrol in 62° 32' N., 13°35' W., at 1445 today, steering S.S.E; but contact with her was lost in the heavy rain.

Two mines were dropped by aircraft between the Castle and Fort Burgoyne at Dover at about 2100 tonight, causing only very slight damage and one slight casualty.







Three sticks were seen to burst on Jetty where 2 battleships were moored causing fires which burnt for 15 minutes. 5 hits were registered on a concentration of cruisers a and destroyers and nearby four large flashes appeared at one minute intervals. Other fires were burning when target was left. Weather at first fine - clear and brilliant moon - target easily identified. 2000 - Oll5 Wellingtons despatched to same. Although target was located in fleeting glimpses through gaps in cloud only one aircraft was able to drop his load on Port near battleship. A second Wellington was hampered by ice and after an unsuccessful attempt to attack shipping, found himself over Naples aerodrome and released his load on and near this. 3rd Wellington after unsatisfactory attempts to attack ports - located Margellino Station and Junction. 3 large explosions and four fires were seen on and near 4th Wellington identified railway. large buildings resembling factory at Torre Annunziata and attacked same. All 9 Wellingtons returned safely. (H.Q. R.A.F. Med. 0845/15).
